Ascensa Health's services are based on the belief that addiction is a disease and that treatment must focus on the whole person. The agency uses an evidence based approach that addresses substance abuse as well as mental, behavioral, and physical health.

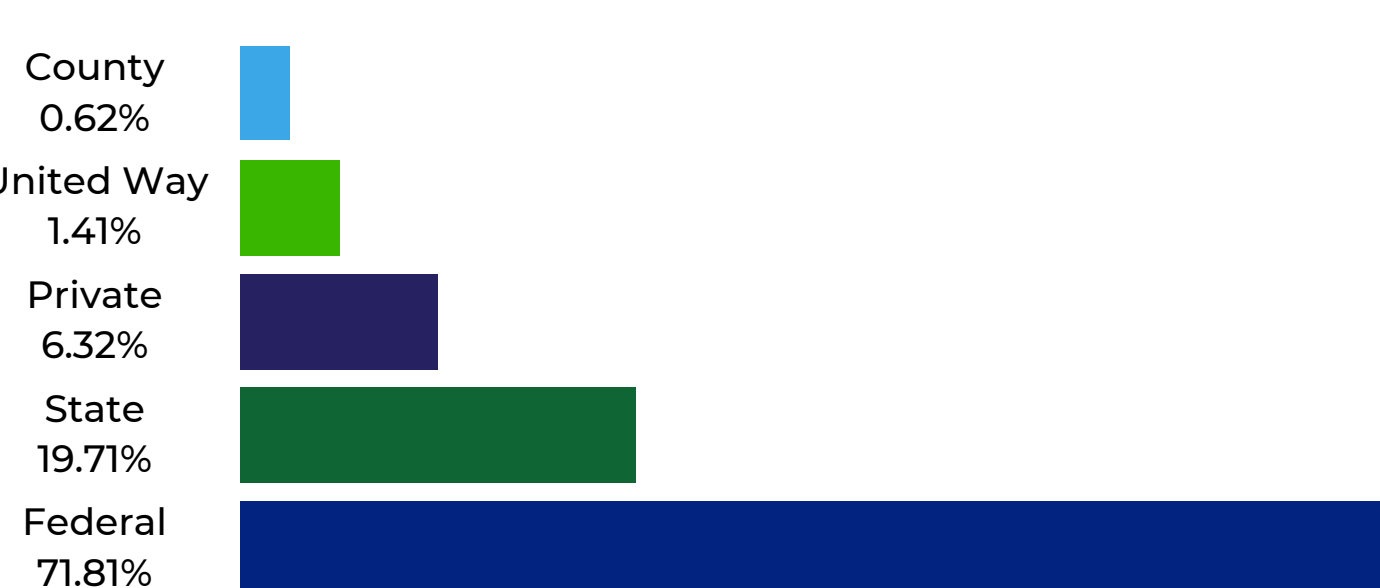


Our History

In 2020, the agency began doing business as Ascensa Health. Ascensa Health was founded in 1962 as a halfway house in Atlanta to address the rising problem of chronic alcoholic court offenders in the community. Today, Ascensa Health is an accredited and licensed treatment center that is steadfastly committed to adhering to the highest standards of service delivery.
